




History- Monday Week 8

In 1776, to help with gaol overcrowding, ex-Navy ships started being used as prisons. These were known as hulks. They were moored (tied up) in rivers and off coasts. Prisoners lived in terrible conditions on board these ships. Disease spread quickly. In the first twenty years, nearly one out of three convicts died. Even though the government tried to spend as little money as they could on the convicts, they were still expensive to clothe and feed. To cover costs, the convicts were often sent to shore to work. Some prisoners served their whole sentences on these hulks. Others lived there until they were sent to Australia. Hulks were only supposed to be used for a short time, but they ended up being used for nearly eighty years. In 1857, after pressure from people who thought this prison system was wrong, the hulk system ended.
